Fur Ball raises more than \$50,000

Memorable rescue stories from 2021 and exciting news about shelter expansion plans were highlights of the ninth annual Humane Society for Boone County Fur Ball on February 26 at the Golf Club of Indiana in Zionsville.

The "Mardi Gras Pawty to Renovate Their World" raised more than \$50,000 to help HSforBC provide ongoing medical care for rescued dogs and cats as well as assist with operational expenses for the shelter at 5366 S. Indianapolis Road in Whitestown. It was the first time that "pawty" supporters participated in person and virtually.

HSforBC executive director Susan Austin told the gathering that fundraising is underway for needs-based shelter renovations to expand kennel space and update clinic facilities to better serve a growing number of homeless dogs, puppies, cats and kittens in Boone County.

As part of the festivities, Austin honored Laurie Durham, a longtime volunteer, dog foster and former Board member, by crowning her the Mardi Gras Queen.

Austin also recognized Boone County Sheriff's Deputy Hannah Fisher for her four years of outstanding service as the county's first Animal Control Officer. Fisher recently accepted a position as Animal Welfare Operations Director with the Indiana State Board of Animal Health.

"I am so thankful for how helpful and friendly the members of the HSforBC family were to me all those years," Fisher said later. "I'll look back fondly on what we collectively accomplished for the animals of our county."

During the program, Dr. Amy Rader, president of the HSforBC Board of Directors, thanked Boone County veterinarians and veterinary technicians for their exceptional medical services that enabled the Humane Society to save the lives of 533 cats and dogs during 2021. Many of the rescued animals were puppies and kittens. One veterinary staff generously volunteered to provide lifesaving overnight care for a litter of tiny puppies suffering from seizures.

Austin also thanked TDS, presenting sponsor; Dentons Bingham Greenebaum, VIP viewing

party sponsor; D.R. Horton, auction sponsor; The Farmer's Bank, prize sponsor; and Realtor Tracy Ridings, VIP party kit sponsor, for their generous financial support of HSforBC's Fur Ball.

Currently, she said, 206 active volunteers and many other dedicated supporters are helping HSforBC continue to grow and care for homeless dogs and cats in Boone County.

"We go above and beyond basic shelter clinic medicine with the love and care we provide every day," Austin said. "We have a great track record for bringing in and helping animals."

HSforBC plans needs-based shelter renovation

The Humane Society for Boone County has two obvious needs right now: to increase the number of animals we can serve and to better serve all animals. HSforBC will soon begin a shelter renovation that will help us meet both needs.

The human population of Boone County has increased 25 percent in the past 10 years. Increased population doesn't just mean more people in the county, it also means more pets and more needs.

"This isn't a want, it's a need," explained executive director Susan Austin. "The animals must always come first and reducing stress for them while in our care is a priority."

HSforBC has well utilized every foot of space in the shelter building, including using existing cabinetry and reusing anything that is usable. In our renovated space we will continue to utilize everything we can. However, the updated layout will streamline care of the animals we take in and help us better serve families who need a little assistance with their animals.

Our current cat space has no ceiling, which means it's difficult to keep the temperatures in the building balanced, and it's easy for cats to escape to the entire building if they get out of their kennel. After the renovation, our cats will have a more comfortable climate, won't hear


barking dogs, and even have an outdoor catio and larger free roaming room to enjoy! We will also have more space to quarantine sick cats, which will help prevent the spread of disease.

As Boone County grows, the demand for dog assistance also grows. Currently, we only have nine dog kennels, and they have a shared HVAC system so illness from a new dog can quickly spread to all resident dogs. We currently have no space to isolate a sick dog.

"Helping more than 533 animals a year with only nine dog runs and 20 cat kennels strains our volunteers and staff," Austin explained.

Our Pet Pantry enables us to help families keep their pets in their homes, sometimes by eliminating the need to choose between purchasing food for their families or their pets. This helps more animals stay in their home and not need our other services. Pet Pantry food is currently stored in every extra hallway and corner in the shelter, but in the future will have a large, dedicated area that doesn't require volunteers to haul carts through the entire shelter to get pet food to those who need it.

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Two shelter areas of HSforBC that the public does not see are the medical and office spaces. Currently, the medical room is in the back corner of the building, has no sink and is not easily accessible. Soon, the medical room will be centrally located so cats can access the space without being carried past barking dogs, and volunteers will have a more practical, timesaving layout. Trained veterinary care volunteers will be better able to provide vaccinations and wellness care.

The entire HSforBC operation is being administered from an 8-foot by 12-foot office. Day-to-day shelter needs, confidential conversations,

meetings and more are held in the one office in the building, where our executive director also works full time. More office space will mean more space for planning, meetings and the shelter's general operations.

Our volunteers will be better able to care for the animals, and the dogs and cats will have a less stressful experience in our building, keeping them healthier and calmer so their personalities can shine, making them easier to adopt into furever homes.

As we receive bids in March and break ground on the renovation in April, we value our donor investments and are grateful for your support! We also look forward to caring for many more animals.

Did You Know:

- ♦ \$5 will provide one heartworm test
- \$20 will provide the first round of vaccines for a dog or cat
- \$25 will provide two cats with FELV/FIV disease testing
- \$50 will provide spay or neuter surgery for a cat
- \$100 will provide flea and tick protection to two litters of kittens
- \$175 will provide a sponsor adoption fee for a senior dog
- \$250 will provide heartworm preventative to 30 dogs in our care
- \$500+ will provide heartworm treatment for one dog

HSforBC had some Double Merle Australian Shepherd puppies adopted recently. A Double Merle is created when two Merle dogs are bred together. This is a bad breeding practice. Double Merles usually have vision and hearing issues. Our pups did well navigating in their foster homes. They knew where everything was. If something gets left out of place they will probably run into it. They were learning potty training and loved being outside. They went to homes with at least one other dog that can be a companion and to great families that have experience with hearing impaired and/or visually impaired animals.

Currently, 48 cat fosters and more than 20 dog fosters open their hearts and homes to care for the kittens, puppies and smaller dogs that would be stressed in a kennel environment. Fosters allow us to care for more animals than the shelter can possibly hold.

HSforBC welcomes three new board members

The Humane Society for Boone County Board of Directors welcomes three new board members in 2022.

They will assist Dr. Amy Rader, president, other officers and board members to continue HSforBC's mission of serving homeless dogs, puppies, cats and kittens in Boone County.

Zionsville resident and longtime HSforBC volunteer Denis Oberg enjoys keeping busy during his retirement years by working on construction projects and maintenance duties at the shelter. His expertise benefits the non-profit community service organization in countless ways.

Oberg worked for the Archer Daniels Midland Company for 40 years. He and his wife, Anne, volunteer by fostering kittens as well as helping with fundraising and events. They have two cats, Raven and Casper.

"The Humane Society provides valuable services to the community," Oberg said. "We reunite lost pets with their owners, through our TNR (Trap / Neuter or Spay / Return and Release) Program, we reduce and control the population of feral cats, and we have an excellent rate of finding homes for animals that come into our care."

HSforBC is always in need of new volunteers and donations, Oberg said. "I have really enjoyed the challenges that several of the projects I worked on at the shelter presented to me. I also appreciated the fact that whenever I needed help there were volunteers who were willing to lend me a hand."

Whitestown resident Nicholas Topoll cares about animal welfare and brings financial expertise to his board service. He began volunteering for HSforBC six months ago, and hopes more people will volunteer this year.

Topoll is the senior manager of Accounting Advisory Services for Crowe, L.L.P. He and his wife, Kate, who is a Canine Program volunteer, have two dogs, Koda and Meeko.

"HSforBC provides important support for the community," Topoll said, "and raises awareness for animal welfare."

Zionsville resident Allison Upchurch has volunteered for the Cat Program since last April and brings legal experience to her board service. She is an attorney for Lewis Kappes, P.C., and the owner of three cats, Senshi, Tsuki and Kiwi, who was adopted from HSforBC.

"I have always loved animals," Upchurch said. "So many of our cats and dogs come to the shelter as uncertain and often terrified animals. I love watching them flourish under our care and support, and grow into confident, happy and healthy animals ready to take on their new lives."

Upchurch encourages community members to support HSforBC because "it is an incredible organization that works tirelessly to support and protect our community's cats and dogs."

HSforBC relies on a strong network of volunteers and community supporters to accomplish its lifesaving rescue work, she said, which includes educational resources, a community pet pantry and connections to low cost veterinary care for people who need help caring for their dogs and cats.

"The Humane Society needs ongoing community support ranging from volunteer opportunities to financial support," Upchurch said. "There are many ways for individuals to help us help the animals."

Did You Know:

You can now visit the shelter on the second and fourth Sundays of each month between 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. without an appointment. Because we have so many fosters, not every animal is housed in the shelter. Meet and Greet applications for a specific animal are always recommended in advance and are available online at hsforbc.org.

The Traveling Microchip

This is an X-ray of a dog's bent leg. That tiny white speck is a microchip that has migrated down the leg, far from the shoulder where it was inserted. This is quite common. When lost pets are scanned, the entire body should be scanned in case of chip migration.


At your pet's yearly exam, you should ask for a quick scan. You want to make sure the chip is still functioning correctly, the location is good and the chip information is correct.

Microchips can reunite families with their lost pets. Remember to check the chips regularly.
