### Jay

In October a call came to HSforBC regarding a dog with injuries. The dog was found tied to a pole at the Flying J truck stop on I65. A veterinary exam and x-ray found he had a broken leg and fractured ribs. He also had fluid in his chest and abdomen, a lacerated liver and an infection was found after testing his urine.

Information we received stated it was a possible case of animal abuse. There is an investigation by local authorities to see if prosecution is warranted.

Given the name Jay, he underwent surgery to repair the broken leg and further examination showed his internal organs were returning to normal. Jay underwent massage therapy to speed his leg recovery and his foster family helped with leg stretches three times a day.

Jay received a new kennel and bed donated by Pet Valu in Zionsville. He seems very happy in it. Jay is a playful guy, and he loves playing with his toys!

Community Pet Healthcare of Zionsville has donated a lot of veterinary care and resources to help Jay.

With the costs of Jay's care mounting, an appeal was made to friends of HSforBC and the response has been overwhelming. To date we have received over \$3900.00 for Jay's recovery and care.

## Cesar Update

Taken from a neglectful owner in April of last year, Cesar was in pretty rough shape. The Boone County prosecutor asked HSforBC to provide care while the court decided his fate. Months later he was officially ours.

When Cesar came to us, he had mange and his body was covered with infectious bacteria that caused him to lose much of his hair. Through vet care and diet we were able to clear up much of the skin infection and mange and it was a joy to see hair growing back on him.

Even though he has come so far, Cesar still has health problems. Chronic ear infections have caused swelling and scar tissue to form in his ear canals. After several procedures and medication he still requires daily ear cleanings. Due to this his hearing is limited.

Cesar has been receiving treatment from a dermatologist for the last two months. We were hoping this would help improve his skin, reduce his itching and grow more hair. While he feels a lot better, the medication has not completely eliminated the ear infections.

Cesar now needs surgery to remove his ear canals completely. This procedure is called a TECA (Total Ear Canal Ablation) and is quite expensive. Friends of HSforBC have given to Cesar's get well fund yet we are falling short of covering medical expenses.



When people look past his skin condition and the way his ears smell, they have the joy of meeting one of the sweetest souls ever. You would think that a dog that had lived with his condition for so many years would be mean or fearful, but Cesar is full of love. He loves nothing more than to be petted and to play with toys on a soft dog bed.

We want to thank all our fantastic supporters for donating \$1435.00 to Cesar's recovery.

And many thanks to Christy, our wonderful volunteer who took Cesar into her home and has cared for him during the past year. Christy has been with us from the start and has opened her home to many of our special needs animals preparing them for the day they find their forever home.

## Cuffs and Collars Update

Many times HSforBC takes in feral or semi-feral cats and kittens that we feel could become great house pets. But since we do not have a physical shelter we must find foster homes for them. Feral cats in a foster home can be a challenge for obvious reasons. A recent conversation with board members and Sheriff Mike Nielsen created a unique and successful program.

A new collaboration with the Boone County Sheriff's Office, jail inmates and HSforBC brings unsocialized and feral cats together in the detention area. The first cats were introduced to this program February 2016. Since then, the program has fostered about ten kittens and four adult cats. The inmates and staff feed them, clean up after them, love and play with them. By fostering, the inmates help socialize felines that have received very little if any human contact. The cats learn to live with other felines, play and build a trusting relationship with their human companions.

Sometimes cats will only need a few weeks to develop their social manners, however some cats may take a little longer. Not only do the cats benefit, but the inmates benefit as well. The inmates are always happy to accept new cats into the program. They keep HSforBC updated on their progress and we are notified when a cat isn't feeling well and needs to see a vet. The inmates know all the cats by name and can tell us about each cat's personality.

Two of the adult cats have since been adopted. The other two adult cats are thriving in their cell environment and are loved by the inmates and staff at the jail. There are currently three young cats in the program continuing their socialization "training". All the others have been adopted into loving homes.

HSforBC provides all supplies needed and transportation to vet appointments. The Boone County Jail staff and inmates provide the love.

## When the End is Near

Whether you are involved in the work of animal rescue and fostering, or you are simply a devoted animal lover and owner, we must all face the eventual difficult decision about euthanasia for our companions. No matter how many times, it still remains tough.

I have been involved in animal rescue, rehab, and rehoming volunteer work for nearly 20 years, and I have personally faced this issue about 10 times. Every instance has been heartrending, and tears flowed.

We're human and we feel and we love and we hurt. But we also have strength and conviction to do the right thing. It is from that well that we collect the courage to do what we know must be done.

I believe when it's time to make the euthanizing decision, we must find the strength to stay with our animal. Stand right next to the table, or on the floor, or in the grass, or in the barn, so that you can be seen

and heard. Put your face down near your friend and speak softly, and gently caress him/her. It's awfully hard, but your animal has been a loyal friend. Try not to scare your friend by wailing.....not yet. You can do that later. You would do this for your parent, your spouse, your child, your best friend. You owe it to your furry companions, no matter how difficult. Remember that your vet has been through this many times and is empathetic to your feelings. You've nothing to hide. The vet will generally give you some alone time after the journey is complete.

Whether you choose cremation or burial is very personal. Let no one tell you that either one is "right" or "wrong". Follow your heart.

Thank you for your support of the Humane Society for Boone County. We really are making a difference in the lives of many animals.

## Five Foods Your Dog Should Not Eat

**Chocolate:** You've likely heard that you're never supposed to feed a dog chocolate, and there's a reason for that. That delicious candy contains caffeine-like stimulants known as methylxanthines. If ingested in large amounts, chocolate can cause vomiting, diarrhea, irregular heartbeat, seizures and even death.

**Grapes and raisins:** While this fruit is nutritious for you, it's toxic to dogs and can cause kidney failure.

**Onions:** They may make you cry, but they can make your dog very sick by causing damage to his red blood cells.

**Avocado:** Avocado leaves, fruit, seeds and bark contain a toxin called persin that can cause upset stomach and breathing difficulties.

**Alcohol:** Even drinking a small amount of alcohol can result in significant intoxication for a dog, which can lead to vomiting, seizures and even death.

Cinder is a little on the shy side. She is cuddly and ready for a new home.

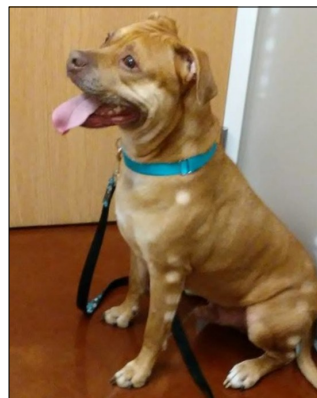


### Maizie, Midge, and Millie

## 12 human foods dogs can eat

1. **Peanut butter:** Giving your dog the occasional tablespoon of unsalted peanut butter is a treat you can both enjoy. (Just make sure your brand of peanut butter doesn't [contain xylitol](#).) It's a great source of protein and healthy fats for dogs, and it's a perfect photo opportunity for you.
2. **Yogurt:** High in protein and calcium, plain yogurt is an ideal treat for dogs, especially if your pooch suffers from digestion problems. Make sure you opt for yogurts that don't contain added sugar or artificial sweeteners.
3. **Oatmeal:** Oatmeal is a good source of fiber, making it great for dogs with bowel irregularity issues, and it's also safe for dogs with wheat allergies. Before serving it to your pet, cook the oatmeal and don't add any sugar.
4. **Chicken:** If your dog requires extra protein in his diet, cooked, unseasoned chicken is an easy addition to his regular food. It also makes a good meal replacement if you're out of dog food.
5. **Salmon:** Dogs can benefit from omega 3 fatty acids too, so slip some cooked salmon into the food bowl for a healthier, shinier coat.
6. **Broccoli:** This vitamin-rich vegetable can be a great occasional nutrition boost for dogs. However, it shouldn't make up more than 10 percent of a dog's diet as it could cause gastrointestinal irritation.
7. **Pumpkin:** You can serve your dog pumpkin — raw or in a can — as a source of fiber or vitamin A. It's also a helpful addition to doggie diets if your pooch is experiencing digestion problems.
8. **Green beans:** Nutritious and low in calories, green beans are a good choice that will load dogs up with iron and vitamins. Make sure to feed your dog only fresh beans or canned ones with no added salt.
9. **Cottage cheese:** This bland food is high in calcium and protein, so it can be a good addition to dog food. However, avoid it if your dog has issues digesting dairy.
10. **Other cheese:** In small quantities, cheese is a great treat for pets, says the [American Kennel Club](#), as long as your dog isn't lactose intolerant (which is rare for dogs, but possible). Choose lower-fat options like mozzarella.
11. **Carrots:** This vegetable is low in calories and high in fiber and vitamins. Plus, crunching on carrots can be good for dogs' teeth.
12. **Eggs:** If your pooch needs a protein boost, scramble an occasional egg for a healthy snack. Eggs are high in protein, but they're also high in fat, so don't give your pet too many of them. Don't feed raw or undercooked eggs to your dog, cautions the [American Veterinary Medical Association](#). There's the risk of contamination from bacteria such as salmonella, and that can make your dog sick.
