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Here we grow again to keep pace with homeless dog and cat rescues



Four years ago, the Humane Society for Boone County was doing the exact same things—renovating and expanding the dog runs at the shelter and creating a larger cat kennel room to better serve a growing number of homeless dogs and cats.

This second round of renovations and expansion of kennel spaces began in July and was necessitated by the urgent need to serve a greater influx of homeless dogs, puppies, cats and kittens.

HSforBC is not a municipally funded or run shelter. The almost all volunteer

community service organization doesn't receive any tax dollars to help with the rising costs of animal care. The shelter relies on dedicated volunteers, fosters, donors and sponsors, who generously give of their time, talents and treasure to save the lives of cats and dogs in crisis situations.

On November 2, 2022, HSforBC's canine and feline statistics were as follows:

- ◆ 9 large dogs living at the shelter amidst the stress of strangers working nearby and loud noises of construction mayhem all day long. Seven of the dogs came to the shelter from the Boone County Sheriff's Animal Control Division. The dog kennel spaces are full.
- ◆ 15 dogs living in foster homes. More foster homes are needed, and HSforBC pays for veterinary care and food so it is easy to open your heart and home to help rescue dogs and puppies.
- ◆ 25 dogs living in foster-to-adopt homes waiting for spay or neuter before their adoptions are finalized.
- ◆ 18 requests to surrender dogs, but foster homes are needed for each pet before they can be accepted in the Dog Program.
- ◆ 44 cats and kittens living in foster homes.
- ◆ 15 requests to surrender cats, but foster homes are needed for each pet before they can be accepted in the Cat Program. HSforBC also covers the costs of veterinary care and food for cats and kittens living in foster homes.
- ◆ No cats can live in kennels at the shelter due to major reconstruction of the rooms that will house them in the future.

Every pet owner in Boone County can help HSforBC simply by spaying or neutering and microchipping their pets. Spaying and neutering your pet is a fundamental part of responsible pet ownership, and keeps the number of animals needing rescue services lower in the future. Microchips and collars with tags make it easier for the Humane Society or Boone County Sheriff's Animal Control Officer to quickly reunite lost pets with their owners.

"We are excited to be returning to the Indianapolis Car Exchange building," said HSforBC executive director Susan Austin. "It's a huge facility with plenty of space for our vendors to showcase their handcrafted creations. Shoppers can bring their pets for photographs with Santa and enjoy looking for special holiday gifts to check off their shopping lists."

Funds raised during the holiday craft show will benefit HSforBC's mission of rescuing homeless dogs and cats as well as The Arc's programming to assist persons with disabilities. The Arc Artisans will display and sell their handcrafted creations at one of the booths.

The Indianapolis Car Exchange is located on South Indianapolis Road adjacent to I-65 near the Humane Society for Boone County Shelter, which is currently being renovated to expand the cat and dog kennels as well as complete other necessary improvements.

2022 TNR projects spay or neuter 88 cats

Humane Society for Boone County volunteers were able to humanely trap 88 stray or feral cats for spay or neuter veterinary care from January 1 through November 11 thanks to individual donations and a grant from the Community Foundation of Boone County.

HSforBC volunteers worked on TNR (Trap / Neuter or Spay / Return and Release) of community cats in a number of neighborhoods and cities to limit population growth. Colder weather has likely ended TNR efforts for the year, but this project will resume in the early spring and HSforBC needs ongoing donor support.

"The Humane Society is focused on altering adult free roaming cats and pet cats to reduce unwanted litters of kittens, which contribute to

a population of unadoptable kittens and cats in Boone County," said Susan Austin, HSforBC executive director. "Volunteers targeted feral cat colonies, areas with free roaming community cats and low-income residents' pet cats."

Cats who received spay or neuter surgery came from high demand areas in Lebanon, Thorntown, Whitestown, Zionsville, Jamestown and New Ross as well as rural areas in the county.

"By spaying and neutering just one female and one male cat, it is estimated that 2,000 unwanted kitten births have been prevented over the next four years," Austin explained. "Half of the cats altered were female, thus preventing 80,000 unwanted and unplanned kittens from roaming free in Boone County by 2026."

By eliminating the ability to reproduce, she said, these TNR efforts save Boone County residents from headaches, heartaches and unnecessary expenses required to bring the community cat population under control.

"Early spaying and neutering are the solutions to future unwanted litters," Austin said. "HSforBC will continue to support these much needed initiatives that assist the root cause of stray cat issues in our county moving forward. We are grateful to the individual donors and the Community Foundation for providing HSforBC opportunities to be proactive in reducing future shelter intakes, shelter surrenders and unwanted roaming pets in Boone County."

HSforBC volunteer board member and Feline Program director Dawn Walker has spent many hours working with other volunteers on TNR projects to help homeless cats throughout Boone County.

"Helping homeless cats within the community through TNR has such a positive and dramatic impact on their well-being," Walker said, "by decreasing the amount of unwanted cats, providing vaccines to decrease the spread of disease and reducing the intake of kitties on an already strained shelter."

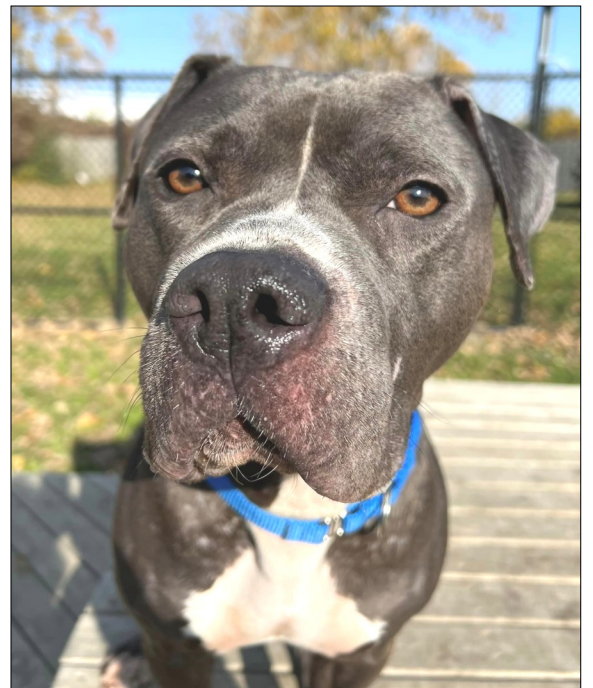
Reagan

Dog's rescue is Christmas miracle

He needed a foster home. I needed him more.

The Animal Control Officer (ACO) received a report of a dog lying in a snow bank along a country road. The caller thought the dog had been hit by a car because the dog had not moved since first seen on Christmas. She stopped on December 27 and the black, gray and white older Border Collie/Shepherd mix dog didn't move or blink an eye. The ACO was able to pick up the skinny dog and put him in her truck for transport to the Humane Society for Boone County (HSforBC) Shelter. The dog was named Samson and placed in kennel run number 8.

HSforBC only has nine dog runs and operates with a dedicated group of volunteers and fosters. The shelter was full, the list of dogs needing to come in was growing, and I had just sent my foster dog off to her forever home in Chicago. Samson went to a foster home, but didn't settle in well. I had space in my home, and after he received his first set of vaccinations he came to foster at my house. Samson had tested positive for heartworm.

I lost my two heart dogs suddenly in August and September 2020. My heart hadn't healed and I

couldn't talk about my diva dog Kaya or Mukki the miserable malamutt without tearing up. None of the adult or puppy fosters I had cared for in my home mended my broken heart. They were fun and sweet, but the hole just wasn't healing and I wasn't ready to have my broken heart broken again. I wasn't doing it, wasn't going to go through that loss again, and wasn't getting attached to a heartworm positive dog.

It was cold and getting colder, as low as one degree, and other found dogs needed shelter so Samson came to my house. He was only staying for a bit—just long enough to get through heartworm treatment.

Samson came in on his best behavior! He walks well on a leash and he doesn't pull. He sits for leashing up and tells me when he has to go outside. The only issue I saw was that he didn't want to jump into the back of SUVs and refused to crate up at another foster home. In fact, I had to have him brought to my house in another volunteer's vehicle. But once home, he showed himself to be a housebroken gentleman and was allowed to sleep wherever he liked. One night, as I went to bed, I told him to stay—and when I woke up he was exactly where I left him. I don't think he moved a muscle all night long! When I left for work, I inadvertently told him to stay and he didn't move until I returned home.

Hmmm. He reminded me of my previous pups.

Samson continued to show me how good of a dog he is. He sat at the door to come in and go out, never once pottied in the house, took treats gently and was just too good! He loves to jump up on the sofa and snuggle with his head in my lap—a trait that just turns me to mush. I've asked him multiple times if he asked the angels what he needed to do to get on my good side. He tolerates the kitties and lets them eat out of his food bowl without any issues. He is a bit afraid of one of them and after a few well-placed swats gives him a wide berth.

It took a lot of string cheese to get him into the back seat of my car when he took some practice rides to get ready to go to the vet for his heartworm treatments. The night before he started his heartworm treatment, he put himself into the crate for bed. I had tried unsuccessfully for a month to get him in, but he must have known it was time to crate up and be calm.

Each time he had his injections, he came home and snuggled close to me for several hours. He needed hands on comfort and assurances to soothe his shaking and trembling from pain. We snuggled on the couch into the wee hours of the morning after each injection. String cheese and snuggles—what a wonderful prescription for healing.

Recently, I adopted Samson. He is officially my baby as of October 16, 2022, and on October 23, 2022, Samson was heartworm negative! I adopted my new best friend. Who saved who? Samson saved me.
