Seven HSforBC rescues 'Change Their Luck' at adoption event By Wendy Gabers

A shelter animal usually hasn't had the best of luck. A best friend is like a four-leaf clover, hard to find and lucky to have as a keepsake. But with a bit of luck, four dogs and three cats found their new best friends and "furever" homes on March 23 at the Humane Society for Boone County's "Change Their Luck" adoption event.

The well-attended event featured eight foster dogs, 10 puppies and one foster cat as well as the animals housed in the shelter. More than 30 volunteers helped visitors meet the animals for cuddles and kisses, complete adoption applications, and provide background and insight on available animals.

Volunteer Adam MacKinnon videotaped the event for the HSforBC website and other

social media platforms. Jackie Nowinski, volunteer program manager, posted live Facebook updates.

The Irish lass of the day was Honey Bee, a Beagle and Bassett Hound mix, and her 10 puppies! Many interested prospective families completed paperwork to welcome a puppy in their "furever" home when they're ready for adoption.

Also sharing the spotlight were two lucky kitties, Midnight and Jibri. They met each other while living in adjacent kennels. A family fell in love with them as they watched the cats play together in a Meet and Greet Room and decided to adopt them both! A double adoption is more typical with a bonded pair of cats or kittens, but these two kitties chose each other. Their "furever" family reports that they are doing well in their new home with each other.

Paisley needs your help with her lifesaving surgery By Mary Ann Garber

Foster kitten Paisley is a beautiful 9-month-old dilute Calico and Tabby mix with a severe congenital deformity. She was born with a soft cleft palate in the back of her mouth, and needs reconstructive surgery in April that will enable her to eat and thrive like a normal kitty.

"Paisley was brought to HSforBC as a sickly 4-week-old kitten," said Kat Bowers, Paisley's second foster and an HSforBC board member. "She wasn't old enough to eat solid food on her own and without her mother we had to assist her. She was bottle fed every few hours around the clock by Dawn Walker, our Cat Program director, who has fostered many orphaned bottle babies. Paisley was not easy to feed though because she didn't like to be touched or held and was terrified when the nipple was put in her mouth."

Undeterred, Walker continued to work patiently with Paisley to feed her. She would gain 2 ounces then lose 4 ounces, and struggle with upper respiratory infections and diarrhea that require ongoing veterinary care and antibiotics. With each episode, she would lose energy and weight.

HSforBC arranged for fecal tests and in-depth blood profiles to determine what was causing Paisley to be critically ill without learning the cause. Walker, her first foster, then Bowers would hand feed her small amounts of wet cat food throughout the day and she slowly started to gain weight. Her sneezing, congestion and fatigue began to ease then she would have trouble breathing again.

When a veterinarian sedated Paisley to examine her throat, it was apparent that she was born with a severe congenital soft cleft palate deformation that causes her to inhale her food into her nasal cavity when she eats it.

Miraculously, Paisley has overcome her fears and is a very loving, playful kitten even with chronic upper respiratory infections. An operation to repair her soft cleft palate deformity will cost between \$4,100 and \$4,800.

Like any kitten, Paisley loves to play with toys. Walker and Bowers have enjoyed fostering her.

"Paisley is a fighter more than we even realized since learning what we know now," Bowers said. "She kept trying to eat through the worst part of her life. We aren't willing to give up on her now despite the steep price tag for this lifesaving surgery. We are hoping that HSforBC's generous supporters can help us give Paisley the future that she fought so hard to secure for herself—a chance at finding her forever person and living a long, happy life."



HSforBC sets a record for dog and cat rescues during 2023 By Mary Ann Garber

2023 was another very good year for HSforBC. Major shelter renovations were finished a year ago in March, and both the Dog Program and Cat Program volunteers rescued a record number of homeless or surrendered dogs, puppies, cats and kittens.

"What an amazing year," said Susan Austin, interim executive director. "Last year, we had 579 animals in our care at the shelter and in foster homes. That was an additional 66 animals over the prior year and we were still under construction [during the first quarter of the year]. We had 503 adoptions, up from 436 adoptions the year before. Our dog and cat volunteer leads really kicked into high gear to get all those animals adopted so congratulations go to them."

HSforBC also accepted 94 animals from overcrowded shelters, she said, and some of the rescues were listed as high risk for euthanasia at those facilities.

Throughout the year, HSforBC's Pet Pantry distributed 32,868 pounds of dry kibble and 25,263 cans of wet food to Boone County pet parents in need of assistance.

"We're so proud of that program," Austin said. "It helps keep animals where they need to be—in the home where they're loved—versus having to be surrendered to us just because the pet owners can't afford to feed them."

Last year, Humane Society volunteers logged 17,584 hours of service, she said. Of that number, more than 10,000 hours were donated by volunteers caring for the dogs and cats.

HSforBC further assisted pet owners in need of help by arranging spay or neuter services for 101 animals owned or cared for by community members.

"Our medical volunteers administered 2,262 vaccinations last year," Austin said, "and we microchipped 492 dogs and cats."

Best of all, HSforBC remains a "No Kill Shelter," she said, with a live release rate of an amazing 97.04 percent of the dogs and cats in the Humane Society's care.

That's lots of good news to celebrate as HSforBC volunteers look ahead to another busy year of helping save the lives of homeless and surrendered dogs, puppies, cats and kittens then preparing them to find their "furever" homes.




April is Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Month. This month is dedicated to raising awareness about the mistreatment of animals and finding ways to combat animal cruelty.
