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Orphaned bottle baby kittens require skilled care to survive By Mary Ann Garber



Paisley, a bottle baby rescued on July 8, nurses from a tiny kitten bottle expertly held by Cat Program director Dawn Walker. Paisley is a pretty little Calico kitten who is pretty lucky too.

She is a tiny miracle who was found orphaned on July 8 then rescued by HSforBC Cat Program director Dawn Walker, a registered nurse and experienced bottle feeder. When she weighed Paisley the first day, the kitten was the size of a 1 week old but her incisors were visible in her mouth, her ears were open and she could walk as well as a 3 week old.

Walker has saved the lives of more than 30 bottle babies, which means feeding them kitten milk replacement formula every two or three hours around the clock, gently massaging their bottoms with a cotton ball or toilet paper so they can urinate and pass stool, and keeping them warm because they can't regulate their body heat until about four weeks of age.

It takes a lot of time, patience, love, energy and sacrifices to nurse bottle babies to a healthy weight and age then help them learn to eat on their own. Sleep loss is challenging because the tiny kittens must be bottle fed throughout the night. She sets an alarm and keeps the kittens' kennel with heated bedding nearby to monitor and feed them easily.

Walker said she feels extreme relief when bottle babies are able to eat slurry—canned kitten food softened with formula or water. Until then, she feeds the kittens on a blanket on her lap with their four paws down and holds the tiny bottle in place in the same position they would nurse from their mother.

"The kittens like to knead the blanket to make the milk 'flow,' " she said, as they would instinctively do on their mother's stomach. Lots of cuddle time is part of the nurturing process to help the kittens thrive and bond with her. She weighs the kittens twice a day at first then once daily to make sure they are growing properly.

"Kittens will typically start using a litter box around 3 weeks of age," Walker said. "Most will start to transition to wet food at 5 to 6 weeks old. Dry kitten food is available at all times by this stage. A smaller kennel space should be used for kittens until 5 to 7 weeks to keep them safe and limit their activities."

An orphaned kitten is cared for separately for two weeks to monitor for illness then placed with kittens the same age for socialization. Shoes aren't allowed in the kitten room in her home to prevent visitors from accidentally stepping on them because they can run fast.

Paisley progressed to eating slurry in addition to bottle feeding on August 9, a day after Walker began bottle feeding four newborn kittens who need around the clock care.

On July 8, Cat Program director Dawn Walker began caring for one tiny kitten without a mother. Then exactly a month later, four orphaned newborn kittens were rescued on August 8.

Kitten foster and longtime volunteer Anne Oberg, a trained bottle feeder, rushed to the shelter to take care of the neonates until Walker, an experienced bottle baby nurse, could pick up the orphans and take them home.

Walker is now providing skilled care around the clock to feed and save the lives of the four newborn kittens. It's exhausting work because the neonate kittens need to be bottle fed every one and a half hours. She takes the kittens with her whenever she has to leave her house.

"Four neonates were brought to the shelter needing immediate help," executive director Susan Austin said. "Our cat lead is looking at another five weeks of bottle feeding to help them thrive—not counting all the prior months of bottle feeding since kitten season started. It takes a village. Please spay or neuter your pets!"

Thankfully, the older bottle baby kitten progressed to eating slurry in addition to bottle feeding on August 9, a day after Walker began providing intensive care for the newborn kittens.





Microchips help bring lost pets home safely By Mary Ann Garber



In July, this friendly dog wandered away from home in Lebanon. The finder requested a microchip scan and the dog was reunited with the owner.



Blu was found on July 25 walking along 100 South in Boone County. He was scanned for a microchip and returned home safely.

What do these two dogs have in common?

Both dogs were lost recently in Boone County. They were found by concerned animal lovers who took care of them and tried to find their owners. When they were scanned for a microchip, both dogs were chipped and their correct information was on record with the chip companies. Both dogs were reunited with their loved ones and happy to be home again.

National statistics indicate that 1 in 3 pets gets lost at least once in their lifetime. Even indoor only cats can get outside then may be lost, hurt or killed.

Microchips help get pets home safely if registrations are updated with current owner information. However, only 6 out of 10 microchips are registered in chip company databases. Dogs that are microchipped are more likely to be returned home, and microchipped cats are 20 times more likely to be reunited with their owners.

Pet owners should write their phone number on the inside of a pet's collar with a permanent marker, attach veterinary tags on the collar, get their pet microchipped, update identification information with the chip company and take photos of their pet to post on social media if lost. They also need to properly secure their outdoor yard space with fencing, and keep their pet's presence visible when outside.

Sometimes pets are found years later and miles away from home. An implanted microchip will continue to work during a pet's life, and the dog or cat will make it home quickly if the pet owner's contact information is correct with the registration agency.

If the unthinkable happens and a pet slips out of the house or gets away at another location, contact the Humane Society, area veterinarians and the nonemergency Dispatch number at 765-482-1412, extension 4, to report your cat or dog as lost and provide your phone number.

"Everyone celebrates when a found dog or cat has a microchip and the pet owner's information is current," HSforBC executive director Susan Austin said. "Most veterinarians and police departments in Boone County have microchip scanners and will scan a found pet free of charge. Please microchip and tag your pets so they can get home quickly when found."

It's been awesome to see how platforms like TikTok can raise awareness on certain rescues and adoption.


Kane's TikTok reached 11,400 views, the account has more than 4,400 likes, and a total engagement of over 15,000!



Without an animal control officer at the Boone County Sheriff's Department, HSforBC is fielding more requests than ever to pick-up and take in lost and abandoned animals. HSforBC can't take in every animal, and we don't have the powers of animal control. We simply don't have the space or enough volunteers to care for more animals than we can humanely house at the shelter and in foster homes.

HSforBC needs your help. Thinking about adding a new pet to your home? NOW is a great time to do it! Check our adoptables on our website or Facebook page. Each pet adopted to a loving home opens up a space for another to be helped. Not ready to adopt but love dogs or cats? Foster! Do you have room in your heart and home to foster one of the cats or dogs that is up to date on vaccinations in your home? If you do foster, your help would allow another dog or cat to receive care and we will supply the crate, food and monthly preventatives needed until that pet is adopted. You can help choose their furever home parents!

If you see a lost pet—before you pick up the dog or cat—please try to see if it belongs to any of the houses close by. Knock on doors. Call Dispatch (765-482-1412 x 4) to request an officer to check for a microchip. If you find a pet, can you foster it in your home or garage safely until the owner can be found? Can you safely approach and handle the pet? If you can and can safely transport the animal, any vet will scan for a microchip free of charge. Can you keep the pet separate from your personal animals to make sure it's healthy, and to help you do that we can provide crates and food to help you feed the pet. Can you help post a photo of the pet with contact information on social media, flyers around your neighborhood and on <u>IndyLostPetAlert</u>?

Now, more than ever, if you can, adopt. If you can't adopt, can you foster? If you can't foster, can you volunteer to help care for the animals at the shelter or help us share our mission at events? And if you can't volunteer, can you donate to help us help crate, feed and medicate those pets in foster and waiting to come in for help? We love our furry friends, and know you do too. Please help us help them in the shelter, in the foster homes and in our community. Our four-pawed furry friends need our combined help. Together, we can make a difference.
