Being a volunteer for HSforBC has brought joy into my life in multiple ways. The journey started in March 2020 when I adopted a cat named Katie from the shelter. She brought so much joy and light in my life as the world was slowly shutting down during the beginning of Covid 19. She helped me get through an unbelievable amount in those few short months when we were home together every day.

I slowly learned what all HSforBC did to help her find a new home and wanted to help other cats like her. I started to volunteer in June 2021 and have been working with the cats at the shelter twice a month since then.

Even though I had my own cat, I found joy in volunteering with more cats at

the shelter—especially those that I got to see during multiple volunteer trips there. They tended to be more shy and apprehensive cats like Katie. Seeing the difference in their behavior during every visit warmed my heart. They were more playful, trusting and open to people with each visit. Helping these cats feel safe is one of the biggest joys that comes from working with them.

During one of my volunteer days, I met a black and white Tuxedo cat named Socks, who seemed like the perfect fit for my home and as a companion for Katie. The next day, on June 14, I brought my husband Cory to the shelter so we could have a Meet and Greet with Socks. I put the cat carrier in the car just in case he was the right fit for us.

After we played with Socks in the Meet and Greet room for a few minutes, I brought the cat carrier into the room. Socks darted across the room and jumped into the cat carrier! He chose us and we couldn't say no!

Socks is one of 70 cats adopted from January through November. During that time, 155 kittens under 6 months of age also found their forever homes.

More than 230 HSforBC dogs and puppies were adopted in 11 months

What are the best gifts you can give to HSforBC Dog Program volunteers?

Adopt a homeless or surrendered dog or puppy rescued by the Humane Society and provide a loving forever home. Or donate funds to help with veterinary care expenses for an ill or injured dog or puppy.

From January through November, 101 dogs and 135 puppies under 6 months of age that were in HSforBC's care found their people and have wonderful lives now.

Donations from generous supporters also made it possible for HSforBC to arrange for veterinary care to help 22 ill or injured dogs and puppies during the first 11 months of 2023.



These dollars help provide heartworm treatments and preventatives, monthly flea and tick preventatives and many of the veterinary related items that go directly to the care of the animals, Austin said. "We appreciate the extra generosity of those wishing to make a positive impact for the animals in need during the holiday season."

Your monetary and material donations help HSforBC rescue homeless and surrendered dogs, puppies, cats and kittens in Boone County then provide food, shelter and veterinary care for them.

Your donations of pet food and supplies not used for shelter dogs and cats or foster pet care go to HSforBC's Pet Pantry and are given to pet owners in need of assistance.

Your material donations of dog and cat food, clean and gently used pet beds and other supplies, the original blue Dawn dish soap, laundry detergent and paper products are helpful. We cannot accept donations of pillows, cushions, bedspreads and comforters because the dogs may chew on and eat the stuffing. HSforBC is unable to accept syringes or medicines except for unopened heartworm preventatives and flea/tick medications.

Thank you all so much! Your help makes it all happen!

It must seem like we are always tugging on your heartstrings to give just a little bit more to support HSforBC. I know each of you care about the animals' needs just as much as we do. At the end of every year, we are full of thanks for the thoughtful donations received and want to share how you made a difference.

With your help, we surgically repaired the broken legs of Cullen/Kofi, Shea and Gruyere. With your donations, our medical volunteers administered 2,068 vaccinations and implanted 449 microchips in the dogs, cats, puppies and kittens. We lost five pups to the dreaded Parvo virus, but were able to medicate and carefully nurse several litters through this viral nightmare thanks to your donations.

Kitten season started early and has barely slowed down. Kitten food, probiotics, antibiotics, fecal tests and extensive deworming medications have become necessary for almost every litter of kittens these days.

Where do your donations go? You help heat the building that keeps the animals warm, cool the shelter in the summer and wash all the bedding. You help provide required vaccinations, monthly medicines, flea and tick prevention, and every special drug prescribed in between. You help provide spaying and neutering to limit the cycle of abandonment and surrender of unwanted litters. You help provide food, litter and cleaning products to make sure their home with us is sanitary and safe. You help supply everything our fosters need to open their hearts and homes.

Year after year, our challenge remains the same, and your donation—whether it is \$5, \$20, \$50 or more—makes a huge difference in the health and quality of life for the animals in our care. All of the volunteers, staff and board members of the Humane Society for Boone County thank you for helping us rescue and care for the dogs, cats, puppies and kittens.

We all thank you for your donations and wish you the happiest of holidays.
