Dumped dog on the run for a month is rescued in Crawfordsville

The dog who wandered around Lebanon for two weeks in April and evaded multiple rescue attempts disappeared in the country and then somehow made it safely to Crawfordsville.

Lost in the Great Unknown. That's what HSforBC volunteers thought happened to a little brown dog who wandered around Lebanon for two weeks in April then ran north on Elm Swamp Road to State Road 47 and was last seen on Caldwell Road.

The Pug mix wouldn't stop running even though many Lebanon residents tried to help him as he followed a circular route around north side neighborhoods each day and even ventured downtown as far as the Post Office and further south on Indianapolis Avenue. HSforBC volunteers placed a humane trap at various locations in attempts to rescue him without success.

Posts by concerned animal lovers on HSforBC's Friends Facebook site documented his daily journeys.

"He is now at Witham's [hospital] parking lot," one person posted. "He's in Golfside right now," another person reported later. "Just saw him on Grant Street behind the Lebanon Middle School offices," yet another person posted. "He is on Elm Swamp in the fields. I couldn't get him," was one of the last posts on the day he disappeared in the country.

For two weeks, the dog had also been seen at Harney Elementary School, Lebanon High School, Memorial Park and Ulen Golf Course as well as in Rolling Meadows, Lakeside Crossing, Northfield, Brendanwood, Westmoor, Ulen North, Chadwick, Elmwood and Ulen. In one neighborhood, he walked up several driveways and looked at the houses then moved on down the street.

HSforBC volunteers were heartbroken when he vanished along a country road and feared the worst because coyotes live in a nearby wooded area.

"I'm afraid that he's going to disappear now that he's out of populated areas where we were getting frequent sightings," said Amanda Bishop, an HSforBC Dog Program volunteer who spent many hours searching for the dog she named Houdini.

Gone but not forgotten, the little brown dog somehow made it safely from Caldwell Road and probably followed Sugar Creek all the way to Crawfordsville where Misha Anderson, executive director of the Animal Welfare League of Montgomery County, and AWL staff members were finally able to catch him on May 17. After tracking his movements for two and a half days, they baited three traps with dog food and sardines, but he wasn't interested in eating those foods. When they tried Vienna sausages, he finally went into the trap they had placed by a dumpster.

J.J. Dumpster Diver was rescued by Animal Welfare League of Montgomery County staff members. He will receive special care to help him recover from being dumped in Boone County in April. HSforBC volunteers tried to rescue him multiple times and named him Houdini because he kept disappearing minutes after reported sightings.

"At one point, six of us [AWL staff members] were out keeping him away from Highway 136 so he wouldn't get hit," Anderson said. "I'm going to guess him to be between 6 and 10 [years old] without looking at his teeth just by his demeanor. His muzzle is gray. He's super tired. He needs a lot of rest and it's going to take a lot of patience. I have not been able to touch him much. I can pet him under his jaw, but cannot touch his head. He has the characteristics of a dumped dog. He is fearful of humans. He wants to love you. He wags his tail."

Anderson named him J.J. Dumpster Diver. She plans to feed him by hand and pet other dogs in front of him so he can learn to trust her and accept human touch.

"Our staff will work with him," she said. "He will spend a lot of time in my office where he will just watch me for days and then we will love on him in kind and gentle ways."

Typically, "abandoned dogs really get disoriented and go into survival mode, and it makes their [rescue] journey that much longer," Anderson said. "I think this guy is a prime example of why abandoning a dog, dumping a dog, is so traumatic. ... It takes them months to recover from that because they had to rely on a human for their entire life to provide food

and shelter and now all of a sudden that's gone. So every human from then on is a bad person until one human can come along and gain his trust."

J.J. apparently walked at least 45 miles from Lebanon to State Road 47 to Indianapolis Road in Crawfordsville. Add in the miles he logged running around in circles in Lebanon all day long for two weeks and his sad journey is quite remarkable.

"I think he's healthy, but he's starting to look a little thin," Anderson said. "He's doing good, and we can't wait for him to come out of his shell."

HSforBC volunteers are overjoyed that the dog on the run has finally been rescued, executive director Susan Austin said. "Our volunteers are so relieved and grateful that he is safe at the Montgomery County shelter."

Boone REMC - Operation Round Up Grant helps give back

"The countless hours put in from the volunteers and staff to love and care for these animals is truly inspiring," Barrett said. "The animals are so loved, and we hope you will love them too."

Now that HSforBC has received the Chamber "Impact Award," the Humane Society is eligible to be included in the voting for "Impact Award of the Year."

Indiana Native Plant Society helps HSforBC landscape yard at shelter

Thanks to a partnership with the Indiana Native Plant Society, HSforBC volunteers and society members worked together on May 20 to create a beautiful landscaped area in the front and side yards of the shelter. They planted trees, shrubs, perennials and grasses that are native Indiana species.

HSforBC volunteers are helping displaced cat colony in Lebanon

Demolition underway this spring at the Daryl Trace Trailer Park in Lebanon has resulted in the need for new homes for a cat colony living there.

HSforBC and Jet's Animal Services rescued some of the cats and kittens in May, and volunteers hope to be able to help more of the cats in coming weeks.

After a woman found a litter of three very young kittens on May 9 in the former trailer park, Jet's Animal Services was able to place them with a nursing mother.

In recent weeks, Humane Society volunteers rescued a friendly gray female Tabby who is safe at the shelter, a skittish dilute Calico cat who now has a wonderful caretaker and new barn home, and a friendly ginger Tabby boy who now lives on a four-season porch as an indoor cat and outdoor mouser.

Feline Program director Dawn Walker arranged for veterinary care for the cats, who were not spayed, neutered or vaccinated, and helped another volunteer find suitable homes for two of the cats. Norma, the friendly gray Tabby, is available for adoption as an indoor pet.

Some of the cats left the trailer park when the bulldozer began demolishing the mobile homes, but volunteers are putting food out for any remaining cats and will resume rescues if more cats are found there. Those cats will probably need safe barn homes after receiving veterinary care.

This rescue project is yet another example of HSforBC volunteers quickly responding to situations where homeless cats and dogs desperately need help.
