The weekend that Whitesell planned to watch Bugsy was the same weekend that she had plans to host her extended family at a cabin.



The Community Within: HSforBC offers loving help

Labor Day 2022 unfolded much like any other ordinary day. I was eager to spend time with my two cherished canine companions, Cami and Smudge.

Cami was my first foster failure that I adopted quickly in 2017. She entered our shelter's care as part of a rescue operation assisted by HSforBC involving a hoarding situation. When I first laid eyes on her within the shelter's walls, there was an irresistible pull in her gaze that tugged at my heartstrings. Senior dogs often face challenges getting adopted so I was fortunate for the opportunity to bring her home. In just a few short weeks, it became abundantly clear that I couldn't let her go and I officially made her part of my family. She was a true soul mate.

Smudge, on the other hand, was my most recent foster dog, but he had already etched a permanent place in my heart and was on the brink of officially becoming the

newest addition to our family. He was a young, energetic member of the Bully breed who had been abandoned at a hotel and it was later discovered that he had heartworms. Under the care of HSforBC and the compassionate souls like Dr. Amy Rader and Christy Brubaker, Canine Program director, a treatment plan was devised for him. To successfully treat his heartworms, he needed a quieter, monitored environment with the necessary medication which led me to bring him home.

Cami and Smudge were the missing pieces I needed as I moved my life forward.

I can still vividly recall the events that unfolded on Labor Day in 2022. After being gone for about 45 minutes, I arrived home and when I pulled into my driveway a commotion of alarms blared and the acrid smell of smoke instantly filled the air after the garage door opened. Panic surged as I rushed inside and was met by a terrifying scene—the gas stove and cabinets were ablaze and thick smoke shrouded everything. Panic turned quickly into desperation as I called out for Cami and Smudge repeatedly.

Not thinking, I went in, crawling on the floor armed with a flashlight. I continued to call their names as I tried to feel for any signs of my pups.

Amid the turmoil, I was able to find and pull Smudge's motionless body out the front door. My untrained attempts at resuscitation proved fruitless. As I sat there, the heart-wrenching realization that I couldn't continue my search for Cami hit me quickly—a realization that crushed my soul. The thick suffocating smoke inside my home was a stark reminder of how insidious and destructive a fire can be, which I had never truly comprehended.

I knew I had to inform HSforBC executive director Susan Austin about Smudge, who was still technically a shelter dog. As I relayed the heartbreaking news of Smudge's passing, a massive lump formed in my throat and I choked back tears. The noise of sirens soon filled the air as firetrucks and police vehicles arrived then rescue workers asked me a barrage of questions. My pleas to the firefighters to find my beloved dog Cami grew louder and more desperate. It felt like an eternity before they finally ventured inside to search my house.

Unbeknownst to me, Susan reached out to Laurie Durham and Dan Chatson, two dedicated HSforBC volunteers who live nearby. They rushed to my

side without hesitation, and I remember how tightly I held onto them. Both Laurie and Dan have families but were steadfast about remaining with me throughout the chaotic ordeal. They helped me navigate the deluge of inquiries, paperwork and overall tumult of the tragic situation.

Ultimately, the destiny of Cami became painfully clear when I saw her being carried out of the house. With both Laurie and Dan by my side, I sat there on the ground where Cami and Smudge were placed, tears streaming down my face. In that agonizing moment, I felt lost and unsure of what steps to take next. Thankfully, Susan and others at HSforBC had arranged for both dogs to be entrusted to a pet memorial service. It was a much needed comfort amidst my overwhelming grief in that dark hour.

Laurie and Dan remained with me long after the crowd had dispersed and the firetrucks had departed, offering their unwavering support. Together, we waited in silence until the time came for Cami and Smudge to be transported to the pet memorial service. As I watched them being loaded tenderly into the van, a deep sense of reassurance washed over me knowing they were in caring hands. However, a profound truth resonated that they were gone. I had clung to a sliver of hope that they might somehow awaken during our time together in my yard, but that hope had now evaporated. This is an experience etched into my heart, a memory I will carry with me always. They were my happiest hello and my most difficult goodbye.

I've always had a profound respect for our shelter and the volunteers but this is more than just an organization. On that day, it was a family I desperately needed, and none of them hesitated to provide solace and assistance. Becoming a volunteer in 2015, I never would have imagined all that I would gain. My gratitude knows no bounds for what the HSforBC family did that night. Laurie's and Dan's presence and Susan's support were lifelines during those horrific moments. I shudder to think of what I would have done without them. Not many words were exchanged, but their presence meant everything to me. That night, I experienced the profound comfort of unspoken understanding, a gift that was generously extended to me and that I'll always treasure.

I am extremely grateful for the unwavering support they provided, and I wish to convey my profound appreciation to them and the HSforBC family.

Senior cat Freckles likes to play with foster kittens

When Freckles arrived at HSforBC last November, he was a 10-year-old, unneutered male ginger Tabby cat with heart and kidney problems and—let's be frank—a bit of an attitude.

Now, less than a year later, he's left his tomcat days behind and slipped into a surprising new role as a doting grandfather to a litter of kittens.

He didn't pay much attention to the kittens when all they did was squeak, said Dawn Walker, the Feline Program director who fosters Freckles along with eight other cats. But once the kittens started to hop around, they were a lot more intriguing.

"It's so cute to see him play with them," she said. "Just like with human seniors, the desire to be young again is so strong."

Walker has fostered cats of all ages for more than a decade. She answered a Facebook plea for someone to help care for a litter of day-old kittens and ended up keeping all three of her tiny bottle babies. Now she also manages the foster program for cats at HSforBC.

A longtime nurse, Walker said fostering pets came naturally to her.

"I love being able to care for them," she said. "You go from a situation that could have had a very bad ending to seeing them thriving."

Freckles, like many senior cats, came to the shelter when his owner died. After he was neutered, Walker brought him home and slowly introduced him to the other foster cats plus her own three cats. Medication helps his heart and kidney issues. He's a charmer, she said, who wants to be with his people. He likes to cuddle and sometimes sleeps on her husband Kevin's lap when he's in his office.

In September, more than 25 HSforBC volunteer fosters were caring for 57 cats from kittens to seniors. Almost all will be adopted eventually.

Fostering a senior cat does have its challenges, especially if there are other cats in the home. If one cat wants to sit on a lap and another cat is on it, there can be spats.

"They're set in their ways," Walker said, "just like humans."

Also like people, senior cats may have health issues and special diets. But the HSforBC foster program provides all medications and veterinary care free of cost along with food, litter and even cat toys.

Fosters can bring the cats to HSforBC to meet with potential adopters or schedule visits in their homes away from the distracting smells and sounds of the shelter.

Potential fosters can fill out volunteer and foster application forms on the website at hsforbc.org or stop by the shelter and pick up printed copies. Walker then reaches out to them individually to answer questions and offer advice.

"I wish more people would give it a try," she said. "It really doesn't take that much effort with an adult or senior cat. They're right on your lap, purring and cuddling."

As for Freckles, the one-time tomcat is still waiting for the right owner to find him.

"He's the best cat ever, the cuddliest cat ever," Walker said. "There's no 'only on my terms' attitude with him. He just craves your attention."

She is a wife, mother, teacher and longtime Humane Society volunteer who makes time every day in her busy schedule to help save the lives of homeless dogs and puppies.

"Serving my community by rescuing dogs is a huge part of my life," Brubaker said. "I have loved animals for as long as I can remember, especially dogs. Saving them makes me happy."


If you want to open your heart and home to care for dogs, puppies, cats or kittens, the foster application is posted there too.


Moose
