We are currently boarding dogs due to the shelter construction and that is an expense we don't normally incur.

Also, we have several animals needing special medical care. There are three dogs with skin issues like Mr Bingley page 7. It is a minimum of \$1000 per dog with a skin condition for medications alone - let alone skin scrapings, additional minimal ingredient food and followup vet visits.

Three dogs have tested positive for heartworm which can cost \$700+ per dog.

And three cats are getting dental care. Dental work with our discounts (and we have two that apply) run \$300+ and one is estimated at \$700.

Thinking about getting a dog?

Before making that commitment here are some things to think about.

You will be spending some money. A 24-30 pound bag of good quality food will cost between \$45-60. There are grooming costs. The annual vet visit can run between \$200-\$300 per dog. If you travel there are kennel costs. Heartworm medication adds another \$100 per year per dog. Add teeth cleaning to that for another \$150+. By brushing their teeth you can avoid that cost, but you need to start as a puppy to get them accustomed to it.

I have four dogs, two of which are hard-to-handle males. Each year I have the males sedated and their teeth cleaned. While they are under sedation the annual vaccines are given. This year three of the dogs had their teeth cleaned. Another dog required an X-ray. My cost this year for the dog's annual exams was a whopping \$2200 including the X-ray, meds, and teeth cleanings.

Your dog will need exercise. My neighbors and I handle this in different ways. I have a half acre fenced at the back of my house with a doggy door to the house. The dogs are trained to use the door and can come and go as they please, except in cold weather when the door is removed. One of my neighbors keeps their dog inside a 6X6 kennel with a dog house. Periodically the dog is taken for a 4 mile walk, except in cold weather. neighbor has a 100' X 50' area fenced at the back of their house. Their two dogs are not allowed inside, but there is a good dog house providing shelter from all types of weather. There is also a big tree providing shade all day long from the hot summer sun. These two dogs always seem quite content. With a fenced yard you don't have to walk the dog in cold, nasty weather, and you don't have to worry about the dog getting into trouble or getting hit by a car. I find a fence is well worth the money, and your neighbors will appreciate it too.

If you work a lot or must travel for work it may not be a good idea to get a pet. It drives me crazy to see a dog chained to a doghouse at the back of the yard. Dogs are pack animals and they do best as part of the family. Some dogs left outside and unattended will be barkers. That can drive neighbors crazy and cause friction. Your dog will require time and attention.

Are you starting a family? It might be better to wait a few years for a dog. One of my relatives decided to rehome their dog after the birth of their firstborn. They probably had already decided a dog was not for them. Another relative kept their dog after the children were born, and has continued to include the dog in family activities.

Should you get a puppy or an adult dog? Puppies are so cute, but they require a lot training, time, and attention. It takes several months to housebreak a puppy. And it is easier for you and the puppy to train during warmer weather. After raising several puppies I realized that crate training can be a good thing. But crate training also has rules to follow. You should investigate those rules before beginning training.

Adult dogs from a shelter are often already house-broken. I've had five puppies and three adult shelter dogs. All the shelter dogs were already house-broken and only one was not doggy door trained. Ten years ago I got my last puppy. Amazingly the two older dogs housebroke her and trained her to use the doggy door. I did nothing! The dogs did as well, if not better, training the puppy as I would have done. And I have found I love the shelter dogs, including those two hard-to-handle males, as much as I love the dogs I raised from puppies.

Owning a dog can be a 10-15 year commitment. It can go more smoothly if you think it over and put a plan in place before taking action.

First, there was My Ride. I don't remember the scary days before My Ride, but I was alone outside and didn't know where to go or how to find food, water and shelter. The big metal thing seemed like a good spot to hide—a safe, dark place to sleep away from the loud, confusing world. I was so tired, hungry and thirsty.

But then my hiding place started to move, slowly at first then faster and faster. I was very scared again. I climbed up away from the moving parts, which I later found out was a car engine. When the big metal thing finally stopped, I jumped down onto a busy parking lot with a lot of other big metal things moving past me.

I ran across the lot and found another place to hide under a pallet of firewood outside a grocery store. I was still hungry and thirsty, but felt a little bit safer. Suddenly, people started trying to get me out of my hiding place and scared me.

Next, there was My Rescue. A few hours later, a nice lady with a Humane Society shirt came and talked softly to me. She peeked at me under the pallets, smiled and offered me food that smelled really good. When I stayed hidden, she held a dangly toy close to me so I could play with it. I stuck out my paw and swatted it. This was fun so I followed it out from my hiding place and over to the food in the metal box. Then she quietly closed the door and talked to me while I ate my first meal in days.

Then we went to the police station in her big metal thing, but I did not have what the nice officer called a microchip. So off we went again with me in the box next to her on the car seat. She took me to a shelter, and gently put me in



A very safe place called a kennel with food, water, blankets, litter box and toys. I knew how to use the litter box, and that made her happy. I ate some more food and fell asleep.

More nice people took care of me at the shelter for a week then a veterinarian spayed me, whatever that means, and gave me shots and medicine so I will be healthy. Then I got to go with the first nice lady to a pet store with other cats. I liked all of the people who visited me, and love the family who adopted me.

Last, there was My Rehoming. Now I live with a happy family and I am a very lucky kitten. They told me I have a forever home with them. Isn't that nice?

Peyton Manning adopts abused rescue dog

An abused puppy in Mississippi will be leading a better life after she was adopted by retired NFL quarterback Peyton Manning.

The "tiny, two pound" puppy, according to the Animal Rescue Fund of Mississipi, was rescued from a carnival worker whom rescuers came across at a county fair.

She was reportedly kept in "a garbage bag or tied with a rope around her neck, covered in fleas and infected with internal parasites."

Rescuers brought the animal to the vet, where she was cleaned, had the fleas removed and fed proper food.

The pooch was fawned over by her rescuers and caught the eye of Manning's family, who dopted her.

"She is now a Manning and will live life large with this superstar family," the rescue wrote on Facebook. "Adopted pets are the best!"

Mr. Bingley



Mr. Bingley was picked up in the country this summer by the Animal Control Officer and placed into the custody of the Humane Society for Boone County. It was obvious that he was severely neglected and possibly abused. He suffered from severe skin allergies and extremely

fearful behaviors. He is about 4 years old.

His foster mom says, "Mr Bingley is a sweetheart! He's scared, and even after a month he is still not sure what to make of his new surroundings. He picks up a few pebbles of food from his bowl and runs away to eat (like the food will be taken away). We're working on his trust issues. He likes to be around people and sleep next to our feet, as long as we don't try to touch him. He doesn't like having his head touched. His skin condition has greatly improved! He is now growing more hair. He's in need of grooming, but freaks out when we get close to his face. He is food motivated and begs at the kitchen table. He is smart, follows commands, and seems to understand what is asked of him. He gets along well with other dogs, but won't eat from the same bowl or in their presence. We have to separate him before he will approach the food bowl. He uses the doggy door now and prefers to be outside, but he doesn't like rain. Mr. Bingley needs time to heal and he needs people who will be patient with him. It may take a long time before he will trust humans again."

Construction has begun on the shelter. The dog runs are almost finished and the roof covering will soon follow. We are excited with the new fencing that will allow our guests to roam outside to get fresh air. With the addition of the inside/outside guillotine doors, it will be much easier for our volunteer dog walkers to clean each space. We have found an excellent epoxy floor coating and that, along with all new drainage, will help us to keep the kennels fresh and sanitary. Additional windows are going in to allow more light and ventilation for the dogs. These are just a few of the many upgrades we are making to the shelter.
